FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"Keeping the Faith While in the Grip of Winter"

As much as I love the winter and cold weather, I understand why people flee for points south during the month of March. In other areas of the country, March ushers in Spring. In Door County, it ushers in gray days, cold weather and lingering ice. How do we keep the faith in the grip of



winter? I can't give you a list of sure-fire cures for winter doldrums. I can't tell you that I maintain a cheerful presence in all circumstances (If I ever uttered those falsehoods, my own family would rat me out).[*note: the church secretary would, too*] I turn grumpiness into an art form. The way I keep the faith has absolutely nothing to do with me, and everything to do with God. I have found in the midst of grayness, 'God Sightings' abound. Here's one recent example:

This past month I held a women's retreat in the Green Bay area on the topic of forgiveness During lunch, one of the attendees told me about her own challenges with forgiveness. Her husband is a Vietnam Vet. There were no parades when he came home from war, only heartache and stress. To make things worse, Vietnam vets were labeled as unstable, violent, "baby-killers." In order to have any type of normalcy, the family kept his military service hidden. Leaders in government spent years denying that Agent Orange exposure caused physical damage, not only to veterans, but also to their offspring. There were no support systems for these veterans. It's only recently that she and her husband have been able to tell their story. I could certainly understand how difficult it would be to forgive 45 years of heartache. I was impressed at how she channeled her anger into so many worthy endeavors - using her skills to create items of hope all over the world. There are people who have benefited from her work who will never know her name. After the sessions were completed, she gave me a wooden "holding cross" that her husband makes for hospital patients. It's his own form of therapy. It is very smooth and fills the palm of one's hand. The next day at the Scand chapel service, I shared her deeply moving story, displaying the cross as I spoke. After Chapel I visited with a hospice patient, who was having a very bad day. She spoke of her fear of dying. I placed the cross in her hand. During a visit two days later, she was holding the cross. She was no longer in distress. She said, "today is a new beginning." She died that evening. Someone told me that she held onto that cross until her dying breath. It gave her tremendous peace.

So, dear friends, although I do not have a formula for chasing away the winter blues, I am confident that the God of the ages will make an appearance on the grayest of days.

Debonne, daughter of Christie (Executive Director) and David (Volunteer Baker), is our youngest volunteer. She enjoys volunteering here because it's fun to play with


