"Don't Die before You're Dead"

(Adapted from a recent sermon based on Ezekiel 37- The Valley of Dry Bones)

The people to whom the prophet Ezekiel spoke had died before they were dead. Their homeland was destroyed. The temple, which was the center of their lives, lay in ruins. This temple was not only a beautiful edifice, it was the place where the very presence of God resided. They were forced to live in exile, in a foreign land, away from all that was familiar to them. It's no wonder they were dead before they died!

Living in this hopeless time was a young prophet, Ezekiel. He did not aspire to be God's mouthpiece. God's spirit would take hold of Ezekiel, show him a fantastic vision and tell him to preach it! One day, God's spirit picked Ezekiel up and placed him in the middle of a field full of dry bones. In the vision he was told to speak to the bones. After Ezekiel obeyed God, he saw the bones reconstitute into living, breathing people! Here's the message God spoke to the people: "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost, we are cut off completely.' Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves O my people." (Ezekiel 37:11-12)

God's message to them was "I'm not finished with you yet." It was in the exile that much of the Old Testament was written. It was in the exile that the people understood that the God of Abraham, Isaac & Jacob was the God of the Universe. It was in the exile that the hope of resurrection was born.

People of God, don't die before you're dead! As I write this, it seems as if winter will last forever in Door County. It's still snowing and gray in mid-April. Some of us act as if winter will never end and we wrap ourselves up in its gloom. But God is not finished with us. God's animating spirit is at work today. Don't die before you're dead! If we've given up on a relationship, pronouncing it dead, God says, don't give up. If we've given up on ourselves, our bodies, our circumstances, God says, 'don't die before you're dead', I am not through, I will give you life.' God promises the same power of resurrection which brought Jesus back to life: "If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies." Romans 8:11

People of God, Spring will come, life is here, now. Don't die before you're dead!

Total of 91 family units are represented above; of the ten adult children noted who are now working, six live in Door County at least half the year.

Of those who give minimally, 31 families (30%) gives less than \$20/week. Another 21% give between \$20-\$58 per week.

Our top 3 givers give between \$116 and \$282 per week.

Mt. Morris Celebrates 50 Years

A word of celebration from Mt. Morris:

"The purchase of 163 acres of farmland in central Wisconsin just south of Mount Morris became the first part of a dream fulfilled. With the drawing of a Master Plan in the late 1960's and three district-wide financial campaigns later, the Moravian Church Western District now operates a full service camp and conference center with an impacting ministry for children, youth and adults that is embodied in the camp's mission statement and beyond.



Mt. Morris hosts not only camps sponsored by the Western District Camping Ministry Committee but also camps from other churches and organizations, retreats, conferences, and special events. To celebrate these 50 years of service, the Mt. Morris Board of Directors and staff are planning an event Saturday, August 9 to commemorate this milestone. Specifics are developing but there is consensus that we will have a luncheon/picnic as well as activities, sharing of stories and pictures, and a time of worship to thank God for directing the ministry of Mt. Morris."



If you or loved ones have ever been on chemotherapy, you know that food can taste different--tomato sauces may taste metallic, other foods just lose their flavor. Natalie Neddersen is donating a book to our church library that gives some great recipe for just this problem:

The author says, "Try tricking your taste buds. Use new flavors and spices, so there's no expectation of how foods should taste. "Give your taste buds a "passport for world-wide travel," to countries like Thailand, Latin America, Spain and Morocco. Introduce new spices like cumin, cinnamon, coriander, and all of a sudden your taste buds are



tickled instead of drab....If water or food tastes like metal. add a little acid, like the type found in lemons, limes and oranges. If you feel like you are eating cardboard, add salt." She suggests the healthiest fats, like olive oil, coconut oil, nuts and seeds. Fat is a natural flavor carrier. "Fat is like a magic carpet traversing back and forth across your palate, delivering tastes," she says.
