"Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint." - Isaiah 40: 31

Does God really care when we are beaten down? The people of Israel didn't think so. They were convinced that God was detached from the struggles and heartaches of life. They said, "My way is hidden from the Lord, and my right is disregarded by my God" (40:27). Isaiah tells them (and us) that God not only cares, but gives us three wonderful gifts to those who take God seriously.

They who wait for the Lord...

Shall mount up with wings like eagles - This is the gift of Ecstasy. The times in our lives filled with sheer joy. It's what we feel when we hold a newborn baby, when we dance with abandon at weddings, when the Packers win the Super Bowl, when we view a spectacular sunset. What a gift! But when we're sitting at the bedside of a loved one, ecstasy is impossible. It's a generous gift, but not the greatest.

Shall run and not be weary - This is the gift of Energy. It's the ability to meet the pressing needs around us. We see the gift in our first responders and firefighters who respond to every emergency. We see the gift in our congregation as we visit the sick, send meals, raise funds for inner city ministries, write to prisoners, provide a haven for people frazzled by life. What a gift! But when we're sitting at the bedside of a loved one and there's nothing left to do but grieve, we have no energy. It's a generous gift, but not the greatest.

Shall walk and not faint - This is the gift of Endurance. It is the greatest gift. It is the ability to put one foot in front of the other. It's the ability to get up in the morning, after spending the night in despair, alone. Endurance gives us the power we need to continue despite weakness and sorrow. It's the gift I have witnessed in our friend, Sue. For 2-1/2 years Sue has been given the gift of endurance - through treatments, setbacks and adversity. God has given her family endurance as they shoulder the burden of grief. God has given us endurance as we provide whatever consolation we can to her and her family.

Those who wait for the Lord, who take God seriously, are given three gifts, Ecstasy, Energy and Endurance. We give thanks for the times of sheer joy, for the gift of boundless energy and for the gift which helps us through the roughest times, endurance!





Adopt-A-Grave

The newer sections of our cemetery are bright with flowers much of the year, with greenery over winter. However, the older sections (nearest Willow) are bare. Next time you stroll through the cemetery, choose someone who doesn't have anyone to leave them flowers and do some planting: daffodils, tulips or other perennials. Adopt a departed church family member and pay tribute to their time here in Ephraim.

(The cemetery rules state that all planted flowers will not extend more than eight inches from the headstone. From May 1 to November 1, only live plantings will be allowed; from November 2 to April 30 (during winter months), evergreen or natural material wreaths may be placed on gravesites.}



This month is cold cereal month here at church. Bring a box

Come....Walk in the light of the Lord Isaiah 2:5

More than 350 women attended the 12th Moravian Women's Conference from fifteen different countries. It was held June 25-28, 2015 at Sandy Cove Conference Center in Northeast, Maryland on the headwaters of the Chesapeake Bay. Diane and I drove out a few days early so we could spend time with her grandchildren in Pennsylvania.

Sandy Cove is a meeting center with meeting rooms, auditorium, and dining room. On our way to the dining room, we met four women from Sturgeon Bay, so we sat with them for meals every day.

The first night we served Lovefeast. Rev. Mary Kategile from Tanzania was keynote speaker. She shared her deep interest in women in ministry and the spiritual growth of women.

Each morning, worship leaders from different countries would start with "Come walk in the light of the Lord." Jennifer Sands, keynote speaker shared her testimony of coming to salvation through Christ after she lost her husband in the World Trade Center on 9-11-2001. She discussed the importance of obedience, patience, and confidence as we walk in the light. She has written three books and is a wonderful, positive speaker.

Rev. Craig Attwood was our keynote speaker Friday night. It was an interesting talk about five centuries of Moravian women's leadership in the ministry of the church. Women held a greater role in the ministry than any other church.

A young woman from Nepal talked about her Moravian Church. Everyone in town was a member. While she spoke, there was a slide presentation. She showed us slides of the earthquake. There was so much destruction. It brought tears to my eyes. The people began rebuilding the church right away.

There were 120 workshops to choose from. We could go to four. Two special workshops were offered about mission focus. Two young women shared their experiences. One talked about Cuba, the other one Albania. The editor of "The Moravian" magazine, Mike Riess, came and shared stories about what Moravians are doing around the globe as well as the work being done here at home.

We enjoyed visiting the Moravian Women's Market where you could buy a variety of things offered for sale. We said our goodbyes and left Saturday afternoon for our long drive back to Wisconsin. This was an exciting international worship experience.
