FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

You'll notice, as you enter some businesses in Door County, a sticker in the window, 'We Welcome All.' We have one on display at our main entrance. It is a nice sentiment. It signals to those who enter our doors that a welcome is extended, regardless of political party, race, gender, nation of origin, religious affiliation or any other 'label' society imposes. The Joint Boards signed on to this initiative because we feel that it reflects our values as the Church of the Open Door. We are promising to 'foster a welcoming community for all people who live, work, and visit Door County.' How do we demonstrate this sentiment? How do we, as a church, make Welcome a reality?

In the book of Leviticus, the stranger was to be welcomed as family. For those of you who have lived here all your life, you know the security of home. We are given an opportunity each time someone comes to us who is 'different'. May our Welcome be of such quality that everyone who enters experiences a family reunion.



The Two Feet of Justice: Friday, September 21st through Sunday, September 23rd is an opportunity to take another step for justice! One foot is direct service ministries in providing food, shelter, and other basic needs. The second foot is justice through advocacy and prophetic ministries that call for equitable and liberating change. Issue focuses will include: Criminal Justice Reform, Civil Rights of Immigrants, Racial Equity, Housing, Gun Violence, and Health Care. Featured Speakers include recently retired CEO of the Minnesota Council of Churches, the Rev. Canon Peg Chemberlin, Director of the Social Justice Minor Program at UW Oshkosh, Courtney Bauder, and JOSHUA of Brown County Community Organizer Rachel Westenberg. The Conference will be held at Mt. From the diary of Rev. Mark Andrews October 1918

Sunday, October 13-No services permitted by County Board of Health on account of Spanish Influenza

Monday, October 14-This pastor was surprised by having a FORD brought to his door by the officials of the church. Machine is to be property of congregation but Pastor is to use it as his own. All church activities and meetings have dropped out as long as quarantine against the influenza is in force.

Notes from Nola Knouse(condensed)

Last month I said I would learn more about the Moravian Music Foundation, Rev. Dr. Nola Reed Knouse, director, (She came to visit us June,2017) and share it with readers. The Mission Statement says a lot! *The Moravian Music Foundation preserves, shares, and celebrates Moravian musical culture.*"

MMF (abbreviation) is a 501 non-profit corporation affiliated with the Moravian Church in North America. It's a separate entity which receives less than 5% of its annual income from the Moravian churches (like us) It is led by a board of Trustees of 21 to 28 members, who serve 4- year terms. Its main office is in Winston Salem, NC with 4 full-time employees. Another MMF office operates in Bethlehem, PA under Gwyneth Michel, associate to Nola Knouse. One more thing to contemplate at this time: *the MMF cares for (in climate controlled secure facilities) one of the 10 known copies of the first printing of the Star Spangled Banner*!
