FROM A PASTOR'S DESK-

My friend Rev. Dan Olson brings a timely message! - Pastor Dawn

Imagine how popular Door County would be if it was not surrounded by water? I don't think it's too far a stretch to say that the County would be pretty plain and mundane without the water that surrounds it. We'd be as exciting as most counties that are rectangles on a map. Water is absolutely essential to the life, industry, recreation, and beauty of Door County. Think tourism for a moment. At the peak season it's not unusual to have 10 times the population in residence, nearly 300,000 people – all of whom are waiting in line at Al Johnson's.

This bears witness to the fact that neither people nor the land can survive without water. It's true that a person can survive 3 to 4 weeks without food, but one cannot live past three or four days without water. As desert dwellers, our ancestors in the Faith from biblical times understood the importance of water. From Genesis through the book of Revelation, the Bible is replete with references to water.

Yet for all the beauty, recreation and industry that water provides it has a mercurial and dangerous potential as well. Consider: Sampling results have shown that at any one time in Door County, at least one-third of the private wells can contain bacteria. There are homes in Door County where the well water turns brown from manure each spring. Remember when the water at church was foul and undrinkable?

All this hydrology is a metaphor of what our lives can be like. After drinking the contaminated water of loneliness or depression, of resentment or anger, of self-pity or scorn for others, we seek finally the cup of cold water that satisfies all our longings. There is a “river of life” which flows from the throne of God. This is pure water, the source of which is dependable. Of that “river of life” it can be said, as we read in the book of Leviticus, “fruit trees of all kinds will grow on both banks of the river. Their leaves will not wither nor will their fruit fall.” As we walk along the banks of that river our lives will, by God's Grace, become productive, whole, bearing fruit. Then it becomes our duty and delight to invite others to satisfy their needs.

Jesus told the Samaritan Woman that “whoever drinks of the water I shall give him will never thirst; the water that I shall give him will become in him a spring of living water welling up to eternal life.” This is a promise from the lips of Jesus who loves us, forgives us and quenches our deepest thirst. Remember this: If you feel spiritually dehydrated and thirsty, the water of your baptism never evaporates. It is a constant reminder that you are God's precious child.

Voices from the Past

*From the minutes of the
Joint Board, Nov. 23, 1909
Brother J.A. Smith recording*

Another meeting was held at Smith's store, all members again being present. It was called for the purpose of considering the contents of a letter from Bro. Petterson regarding salary and time for him to take charge. It was decided to guarantee him \$700. salary per annum, providing Sister Bay would agree to furnish a reasonable share. For that purpose, J.A. Smith went to Sister Bay and had a meeting with the board. A satisfactory amount was agreed to - namely \$250. Leaving \$450 for Ephraim. A letter stating the fact was sent to Bro. Petterson, also that the time of his coming here be left to his own discretion. (He settled on April 1, 1910)

The "We Welcome All" movement was begun by the UU Fellowship this year, and it has been adopted by several Door County churches. A welcome is extended, regardless of political party, race, gender, nation of origin, religious affiliation or any other 'label' society imposes. "We Welcome All" reflects our values as the Church of the Open Door. We are promising to "foster a welcoming community for all people who live, work, and visit Door County."

As of the end of September, there were thirty Door County businesses who have agreed to participate in the "We Welcome All" program—you will see this sticker in their windows. In Ephraim, Britta Studio and Czarnuszka's Soup are participating.

Notes for Us from Nola, of MORAVIAN MUSIC FOUNDATION

One major part of the Moravian Music Foundation is preserving valuable music, such as one copy of the original Star Spangled Banner. In addition, the foundation houses several thousand American tunebooks, some quite rare. Several hundred more are from other denominations, other languages and OLD--1544 in German.

Preserving the items is about keeping them safe, in climate-controlled facilities, so they are kept safe from ravages of temperature, humidity swings, pests of various kind and theft. It's about the use of microfilm so music won't be lost. Copies of the microfilms are housed in Bethlehem, Winton-Salem and Herrnhut in Germany.

I like Nola's last words: "making these materials known is also part of preserving. It's not enough to KEEP things. Having things means little if their existence is not discoverable. You have to know WHERE THINGS ARE. "

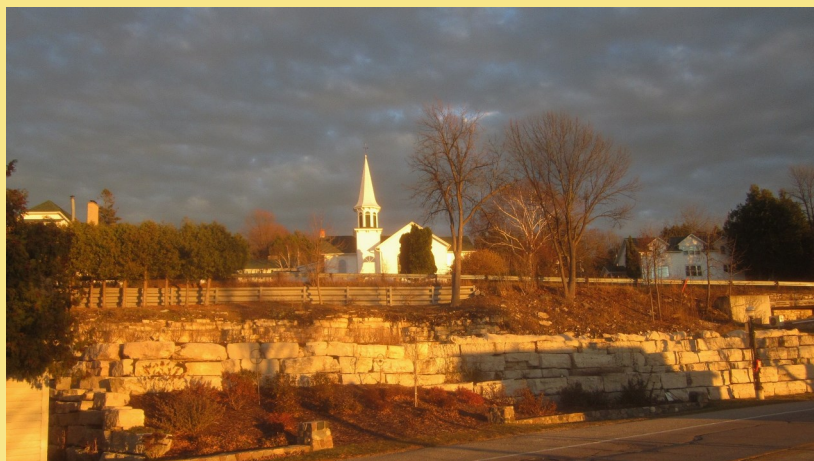
