FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK "Running on Empty" and "Blowing a Gasket" A Modern Parable

In my younger days, I had very bad luck with cars. Before the advent of the helpful 'low fuel' indicator, I ran out of gas on a busy Brooklyn street. I walked to a gas station to borrow a gas can. The can did not have a spout attached, so my friend and I improvised with paper cups, trying to get enough gas in the tank before the cup disintegrated. It was quite a feat! We did not realize that there was, indeed, a spout, which merely had to be pulled out of the rim, until we had spilled fuel all over ourselves. On another fateful day, my car blew its gasket on a highway, many miles from home. I learned the hard



way that in order to avoid that particular catastrophe, one must regularly have the oil levels checked. Those are only 2 examples. There's not enough space to talk about the shredded tires, alternator mishap, smoke billowing from the dashboard, getting stuck on the Verrazano Bridge during rush hour, etc.

My run of 'bad luck' continued until I met Bob. Since marrying Bob, our cars run like magic! And, at first, I thought it was some good 'car karma' that Bob possessed. After close observation over a period of time, I realized that a functioning car was not a matter of chance or luck. Bob is a zealot when it comes to car maintenance— oil changes are done at the prescribed time, he checks the pressure on the tires and has them changed before they go bald! It's not magic, it's a disciplined approach which pays dividends in reliable transportation.

Sometimes I approach my interior life with the same casual neglect that I once used on my cars. I have so many obligations and, in order to fit everything in, I skimp on the one thing that is vital to my well-being. You know what I mean, don't you? The constant work, needs of the family, obligations to the community – we rush to fulfill these demands disregarding our own need for the Spirit of God to speak, restore and heal us. It's especially difficult in the height of tourist season, when the summer seems like an endless sprint. While our tourists are 'restoring their souls', watching the sunsets, enjoying good food at our restaurants, staying at beautiful hotels, we are at our busiest. It's easy to neglect the important work of the soul... in prayer, in quiet meditation, in reading inspirational books, in soaking in the beauty of our surroundings.

I am not suggesting that we throw off responsibilities. I am saying that in order to meet all the clamoring needs that present themselves, we need to schedule some regular 'soul maintenance' - spending time in worship, in quiet reflection, in study, in the beauty of nature... in the things that will renew our spirits. I am reminded of the story in the gospel of Mark. Jesus had been healing and preaching all day. In the wee hours of the morning he went to an isolated place, so that he could be alone with God. If Jesus needed to spend time in restorative prayer, how much more do we!


Your Western District Executive Board is planning a lay leadership conference for November 8th – 10th. The theme of this year's conference is: "Answering God's Call."



Voices from the Past

From the Joint Board records - August 13, 1939 (Although names were recorded in the diary, I've chosen to refer to pastors only by initials. If you'd like to see the complete record, feel free to visit my office and I'll be happy to show you 'the rest of the story'- Pastor Dawn

A joint board meeting with Sister Bay Board present was held in the Ephraim Church for the purpose of deciding on the call of a pastor to take up the work here in September. Brother Loppnow opened the meeting with prayer. Seven members were present. After due deliberations a vote was taken and the unanimous result was as follows- First a call to be given to Rev. E.K. If not available then second choice be given to Rev. R.B. Rev. C.S. was considered, but not seriously, because he is still unmarried. H. Hogenson, secretary to communicate said requests to Bishop Mueller at once.. - H. D. Hogenson, Secretary

As with many attempts to call a pastor, this round of calls was met with rejection- which was fortuitous, for in the winter of 1940, someone accepted the call- Rev. Jimmy Weingarth, whose pastorate is remembered with much respect and appreciation.

The 13th Moravian Women's Conference was held in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, June 20-23, 2019. There were about 430 women with 97 from other countries: Germany, Tobago, Guyana, Jamaica and the Cayman Islands, South Africa, and Suriname, to name a few. After check-in, registration and dinner at the Embassy Suites, we were shuttled to Calvary Moravian Church. The opening service included a communion service which was presided by Rev. Sanette Fleming. It was moving and filled us with faith and hope.

Friday morning at our Worship and General Session, we had the Rt. Rev. Kay Ward and Rev. Christy Melby-Gibbons as our keynote speakers. Dena Grilla Fortuzi, from Albania, spoke about the first Moravian church in her country.

Friday and Saturday, we went to our morning and afternoon Imagine Sessions that we had picked out. Keeping up with the Spirit, Be Completely Alive—Thrive, A Conversation with Sarah, Boost your Unity IQ, and Unleashing Your Power with Chair Yoga.

The best-selling author, Sarah Bessey, spoke to us about her evolving faith in her church life. She had her books for sale: *Out of Sorts, Peace with an Evolving Faith* and *Feminist Jesus*.

Saturday evening we were bussed to Home Moravian Church located at Salem College. We were served a traditional Love Feast by the women, who wore white, and men of the church. Following that, we had a Candlelight Service. It was beautiful! They ended with singing in the square of Old Salem. On Sunday, we left for the airport filled with a renewed Faith.


