FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

A Year-Round Epiphany: I've been talking about Epiphany or 'aha' moments in this season. After receiving our Watchword for the year 2020, I believe that the challenge and promise to Ephraim Moravian Church is that we live the Epiphany, receiving and reflecting an outpouring of light and life within our church throughout the year. The Apostle Paul, imprisoned for the gospel wrote: *Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine...* This power within, graciously given by God, enlightens us, empowers us and gives us success beyond our wildest dreams. Now, 'success' is a loaded word. I do not mean success in our own aspirations. I mean success in living out the grace-filled purposes of God.



'To him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus, forever and ever. -This part of our Watchword tells us how we will know that our work is 'successful'... We will see beyond the challenges, beyond the obstacles, beyond human limitation...to the death-shattering, darkness-piercing Glory of God. Author and Pastor Scott Hoezee, from the Center for Excellence in Preaching puts it this way: "Perhaps no more than a single shaft of sunlight pierced a crack in a brick wall and penetrated the gloom of Paul's cell. And through that beam Paul was able to follow its source clear back to the sun. It still shined even while he was in the dark. It always shines as does the source of that star's power: the love of Christ and of God. It was just the one shaft of light. Not much to it. Not much to go on. You could barely even read a book in so small a light beam. But it pointed to so much more. Paul did not despair over how small his light was but took joy in how large was the ultimate source of that light. Follow along the path of that light beam long enough and you arrive at nothing short of glory. (https://cep.calvinseminary.edu/sermon-starters/proper-12b/?type=lectionary_epistle)

May we, in the year 2020, follow the beam of light God has given to us. May we reflect the grace and power of God in all our tasks, great and small. And when our own smallness limits our vision, may we continue in our work, following the path of that light beam...to an unshakeable Epiphany.

SWEAT EQUITY

Not everyone is financially able to give cash donations to the church. We understand that everyone has bills, emergencies, and perhaps your money is already tight. But we have a new way of giving that won't cost you anything: *sweat equity* — a term defined as "value earned from labor." We've started a list of tasks around the church that often slip between the cracks, and the church staff and our custodian can't always be here when the need shows itself! Here are some ideas of how you can easily and quickly help around the church. You can choose the date(s) or even state that you'll follow through for the month or longer. When you can't give a cash donation, you can be satisfied that you've helped your church in other ways!

"The Changing of the Board"

A few times a month, the announcement board in front of the church needs updating — changing the wording to announce a church event or special musical occasion. Pastor Dawn's back is giving out! Will you be the one to help her mend?

Kitchen Duties

Many helpers for our events take care of their own set-up and clean-up, but specific tasks aren't as obvious and may get missed: For instance, after each event or Fellowship, the garbage needs to be taken out so it doesn't sit longer than necessary. Do dish towels and tablecloths need laundering or ironing? Does the refrigerator need cleaning, or the microwave?

Supplies

What about kitchen supplies (coffee, different sizes of drinking cups, communion supplies, toothpicks, juice, half-and-half)? And is some food past its prime? Do the bathrooms need a new box of tissues or more hand towels? The supply closets in the Fellowship Hall even need neatening once in a while. Other spots could use checking...are we running out of cleaning items in the supply closet (between the bathrooms)? Is there still that pile of broken rubber bands on the ushers' stand in the back? Junk in the book shelf drawers?

There'll be a sign-up sheet in Fellowship Hall. Please feel free to sign up — or even add your own ideas!

Voices from the Past

From the Diary of Wolfram Fliegel, February 1987

Installation of the new boards. Everybody was there, a first in our pastorate here, I believe. Northern Door has had a rash of hepatitis cases, coming from a local cook who picked it up while in Mexico just before Christmas. He was at a New Year's Eve party where he handed it on. Now the restaurant is closed, owner closed it on his own accord. Some did not agree with that, including a doctor in Sister Bay who thought it 'creates panic'. I agreed with the decision, why have a dozen or more extra people exposed to it when they eat in public places?

The village has begun the installation of sewers. A work that needed to be done 20 years ago and is finally beginning to be tackled. Dynamiting is done on Moravia Street. They also dynamited on Highway 42 and on the North end of the village. In May they are to be done... hopefully.

The Northern Door Visually Impaired Support Group is meeting monthly (second Tuesday



from 1-3 p.m.) at First Baptist Church in Sister Bay. There is no cost to attend; call Angie at 920-241-2641 if you'd like to find out more about it.

A few of us are involved in **Bookfriends.org**, which was started by Jendean's college roommate 15 years ago based in Wauconda, II.

We make sanitary pads and pouches to hold them, and they are shipped with books to areas in Africa to allow the girls to stay in school.

While you're cleaning this winter, we can use: 100% cotton fabric, and fabric that doesn't ravel (knit, felt, etc), thread, and 1/2 -5/8" buttons. There is a box at church to place them in.

They can also use cotton, sturdy briefs (girls 12, 14, 16, and women's 6, 7).
