In normal times, after Christmas and Easter, Mother's Day is far and away the highest attended Sunday Worship. It's a day of warm fuzzies. Children proudly give their homemade cards; there might be breakfast in bed, and a Mothers' Day Brunch might be on the agenda. These gestures, great and small, are evidence that we love and honor our Mothers.

Words that define motherhood would be: nurturing, teaching, protecting and encouraging. An image that comes to mind is of a 'mother hen who gathers her chicks under her wings." From our first breath our Mothers are intent that we be the best we can be. Mothers, I believe, exhibit the maternal instinct of our God. None less than Count von Zinzendorf said as much in 1741 when he recognizes the maternal side of the Holy Spirit who comforts as a mother comforts a child. (See John 14:26).

But there comes a time when our mother's care brings us to the threshold of our own futures. All along the way we have been nurtured and equipped to be agents of love, peace and health in all we do. But nothing ever guarantees life won't be messy and dangerous. We have glaring examples of mothers watching their children go into the most dangerous of situations. What's it like for a mother to see her adult child, trained as a physician or nurse or any other caregiving profession, go to the front lines of the COVID-19 war, not knowing if she will ever see them again? Yet *These mothers let go, with hands outstretched in love.*

Mothers everywhere can be encouraged by the sacrificial lives of two Biblical mothers. Hannah's son, Samuel, meant all the world to her. Literally. The only hospice care for women in ancient times rested on having a son to care for them. Yet Hannah let go as Samuel took his lifetime position in House of the Lord. She left him there for the Lord. Then we observe our Lord upon the cross gazing down on His Mother, Mary. What cacophony of emotion was in her heart we'll never know, but She left Him there for the Lord.
