My experience with airline travel has taught me many lessons that I've compacted into this simple wisdom: Plan ahead and follow through. This mainly applies to that crucial time after check-in and before take-off. I always go straight to my gate and confirm my flight. Then I locate the nearest restroom. Finally, I find coffee, a snack and, sometimes, a magazine. Heading back to my gate with my goodies, I settle in for a relaxed nibble and read before boarding. I don't control when the plane will arrive or what time it will take off, but I have done everything I know to do to be ready when it does.

Experience is often the best teacher, providing both immediate and long-term results. Unfortunately, these kinds of lessons don't hold the same power for others who may be going through similar experiences. You need to figure these kinds of thing out on your own in your own way and time. Sometimes it is the hard way.

Today's Gospel lesson may feel a bit harsh on first reading. Ten bridesmaids waiting for the bridegroom to show up doze off for a bit before he is sighted on the road. Half the young women are up, lamps lit and ready to greet him; the other half are so low on lamp oil they are asking their sisters for some, but are told no. However, they are also directed back to the dealers to purchase more so they too can greet the bridegroom and attend the wedding. The prepared ladies offered their best solution, the one that they had put in motion before leaving on their journey. It's good advice, but time runs out. The wedding had started without them, the doors were shut and no more guests were allowed in.

Keeping watch, planning for what you can. and following through on what you know, will not control an outcome, but it will prepare you to meet the situation as best you can. You and I don't control God's activity nor any other human being's choices. A wise woman who mentored me in my faith once reminded me that we must each work out our own salvation. No one else can tell you how, but can only offer their own best advice. It is ultimately your decision how you want to meet God at the given time.
