FROM A PASTOR'S DESK

As one year passes to the next we think of Father Time wandering off into oblivion as the new year is ushered in. Newspapers and magazines detail the year past and list those who have shed their mortal veil.

In our Christian tradition we think of time as linear, having its beginning Creation, taking its inexorable march to the end of time with Christ's triumphant return.

Ecclesiastes says, "For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven". Time has captivated our imagination for centuries. H. G Wells' book The Time Machine comes to mind, or the movie "Back to the Future". It is a fact of life that we can either rejoice in the gift of time, feel doomed by it. Keeping precise time is crucial. We measure time in nano seconds and set our clocks according to Universal Coordinated Time, which broadcasts on shortwave radio incessant ticking, ticking, ticking.

Long ago while still working in radio, we signed off the air with a recording of the Lord's prayer. Our final sign off announcement was timed so that the prayer would begin at 11:57 pm. The last note was heard at precisely midnight. Those three minutes were useful for another purpose – it meant the guys had to have their girlfriends back to the dormitory to avoid getting locked out.

Time is not static. It seems to compress or expand depending on the circumstances. There are truisms that say the more boring the class, the slower the clock moves. The longer the checkout line at the grocery store, the longer the minutes seem to last.

On the other hand, the later you are for an appointment, the more rapid time goes. Also, we can manipulate time to suit our purposes. Daylight savings time comes to mind.

Time seems to be frozen the most when we are the loneliest, the saddest, the most worried. We torture ourselves with regrets over things long past or words spoken in anger that cannot be taken back. There may be some fracture or past sin that haunts you persistently.

As constrained by time as we are, it is good to be reminded that our Lord God is not inhibited by time or held captive by it. God, in His might, can move about freely and touch those painful moments in our lives and make us whole once again. We know God is nearer to us in our present moment than we are even to ourselves. And God is in the future waiting for us to arrive. Whatever pain, whatever tragedy, whatever hopelessness we experience, we can cling to these words of our Lord spoken over our lives – past, present and future – "Behold I make all things new".



December Reports from our Elders and Trustees

<u>Elders-</u> The Board spearheaded a 'Parking Lot Advent-ure' this year. We estimate that 50 people participated, including several non-members who saw our ad in the paper. The elders were tasked with finding volunteers for candle-wrapping, sugar-cake baking, wreath making and parking lot attendants. We were able to send wreaths to all our shut-ins. All donations were given to Secret Santa, totaling \$2,010. Many thanks to all who helped make this a rousing success!

The Board also took charge of a Parking Lot Christmas Carol sing on Christmas Eve. We appreciate those that braved the cold to direct traffic and sing their hearts out. We counted 24 cars with multiple people in each! We thank our music director and all those who made our Christmas Services memorable. Our Christmas Eve Door CANcer offering totaled \$1500. We also received funds for Feed My People-\$130. and Tricklebee Café-\$427.

<u>Trustees-</u> A diseased Ash Tree in between the Moravia Street garage and the parsonage was removed. Our PPP loan was fully forgiven this month. We wish to thank our Treasurer and Trustee Chair for their work in securing the funds and dealing with all the paperwork involved. REPORT FROM BOARD OF WORLD MISSION Hurricanes in Nicaragua and Honduras

"The recent hurricanes in Central America produced winds of 155 mph and 60 inches of rain in less than two weeks.

"In Nicaragua, small towns such as Haulover were destroyed entirely, with scarcely a structure remaining intact. The Moravian Church there was left only with its front facade and steeple still standing.

"In Honduras, over 150 homes were completely destroyed, and more than 800 sustained significant damage. In both areas farms were destroyed, with no rice crops or

bean harvest possible. The Board of World Mission dispensed more than \$115,000 to help with clean water, food, reclamation of farms, etc. We ask for your continued support of the Moravian Disaster Response fund, which allows the BWM to respond to disasters immediately with funds for emergency needs, as well as ongoing rebuilding projects. Donations can be sent to The Board of World Mission, 1021 Center St. Bethlehem, PA 18018."


Bob was born in Chicago in the Portage park area. He attended Our Saviors English Lutheran Church. He was active in Boy Scouts, and many park activities. He later moved to Florida where he met Liz and had a business called Bob's Milk Bar in Clearwater Florida.

It was in 1961 that we moved to Door County and purchased Wilson's from the original owner at that time. We were able to build a motel on the adjoining property known as the Door Way Motel which

we operated until 1983 [that property is now the Village's Harborside Park]. During these years, Bob was Fire Chief for a number of years, and later was voted Chieftain in the annual Fyr Bal Festival in Ephraim.

Liz was born in Flensburg, Germany. In the early nineteen thirties, I arrived in Brooklyn N.Y with my mother and brother. Our father John Herrmann was waiting for us. We soon moved to Baltimore, Maryland where I lived until Bob and I married in St. John/s Evangelical Lutheran Church in 1951. We lived in Chicago for awhile before we ended up in Door County in 1961. We started our life here owning Wilson's. We sold it in 1983 and began our semi-retirement years, and we are very thankful to have made the journey together.

JUDY and JOHN TURNER, members here since March of 1999. They will be celebrating anniversary #65 in 2021. Both were born and grew up in the Chicago area, They met at the University of Illinois, and after graduation got married in June of 1956. John was in the Navy in Jacksonville, FL and Judy taught 2nd Grade. After the Navy, John went back for a degree in Dairy Manufacturing, and worked for Bordens for two years before starting to teach Jr. High School science. Judy worked part-time as a speech therapist in several suburban school districts and then full-time in Wheaton. John took an elementary principalship in Villa Park and stayed there for twenty three years. They both retired in June of 1991.



After moving into the cottage, they decided to attend Ephraim Moravian Church. They knew nothing about the Moravians--there was only one Moravian church in the whole state of Illinois, in West Salem. 
