Reflection: "Hearing Voices" - by Pastor Dan G. Olson

If I were to proclaim that with my own ears that I literally heard God's own voice speaking to me, almost certainly some would say that I am several sandwiches short of a picnic. That's an honor I could do without.

But really, I do hear God speaking, and so do you. Often God's voice can be heard in the unlikeliest places. My very first Sunday school teacher, Marie, was a friendly and kind woman who had the fortitude to conquer my complete rebellion at being left with this woman I didn't know. But she won my heart.
