Reflection - Confession is Good for the Soul

Recently I had doctor's appointment to continue treatment for a chronic condition that never seems to improve. You might say I was loaded for bear because I wasn't a happy camper. Then things got bad. In my shy sort of way I made it perfectly clear that I was getting no help. I informed them I was being poorly treated and they weren't terribly concerned about it. It wasn't a pretty picture.

I stomped out of the clinic convinced I had accomplished my purpose. For a day or two I enjoyed my anger. But then! At the prompting of the Spirit my guilty conscience went into overdrive. I realized I had made a fool out of myself and wouldn't have been surprised if I was invited not to come back. I had a follow-up visit with that same provider a few days later and I didn't look forward to our meeting. The whole situation tortured me until the day I went into the examining room and sheepishly said I was truly sorry and asked for forgiveness. The relief I felt in that moment was overwhelming!

If only I'd had Psalm 32 in mind that day: "*Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not hide my iniquity; I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the Lord', and you forgave me the guilt of my sin.*" I learned, and probably not for the last time, that walking in God's Word and living it sheds light unto our path and overwhelms our darkness.
