From a Pastor's Desk

A good friend of mine, a fellow Lutheran clergyman, told me once that while on summer break from college, he happened to tell his parish pastor that he planned to attend the seminary upon graduation. The Pastor told him, "you'll never make it." How encouraging is that? Can you imagine the hurt my friend felt? In fact, his hurt finally turned to anger ... and resolve.



When I informed a pastor of my home church of my intention to enter the ministry he said, "If you can stay out of it don't go into it." At first, I was startled at what he said. Was he trying to discourage me? Not really. He was pointing out that if the "call" to ministry couldn't be ignored, it was best to say "yes."

My Dad, if he was displeased at something I had done would often bellow out a sharp, terse "What's the matter with you?" Those words never demolished me, but they certainly got my attention and made me think.

We may tire of the phrase, "words matter", but it really is the truth. We can't escape it.

"Lips have no bones, but they have the strength to break hearts".

Think about that! What words might you have heard that splintered your hopes or selfrespect? What words have so discouraged you that you've thought of giving up? What words do children or women who are abused hear? What words have been heard that leaves some with the only reply that comes from the barrel of a rifle?

Let's pray that the words we speak do not shatter hearts and lives, but break open unto a new day. Hear the words of Jesus as he says, "Come Unto me, all who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

Speak a word of life and welcome to your spouse, to your children, to the tourist, to the visitor at church, to the grocery clerk, to the police officer, to the maintenance people. Speak a word of life and welcome ... to yourself!

Moravian Church Northern Province 2021 Western District Synod April 22-24, 2021

Over 100 Moravians gathered virtually to review, discuss and plan the work of the Western District. Sessions included reports, elections, and study/discussions.

Thirty-one congregations (6,000 members) and six boards listed an amazing number and variety of activities that had occurred since the 2016 Synod - many during the pandemic.

The keynote speaker, Rev. Heather Vacek, recently named Dean of the Moravian Theological Seminary, introduced the theme: **"Being the Church: Holy Spirit Empowered."**

She offered her reflections on the role of the Holy Spirit in Moravian beliefs a expressed in The Ground of the Unity. In breakout sessions and "homework" suggestions, delegates were directed to think how the Holy Spirit has, does, and can direct one's work - "work that must be fearless - although often messy."

The closing charge was the challenge to each present: to view the time spent as a beginning to be the Church: empowered by the Holy Spirit.

As a congregation, how can/will the Holy Spirit direct our work?

With almost half of Door County's population fully vaccinated against Covid-19, county Public Health officer Susan Powers said last week that she's optimistic the county will be close to meeting its vaccination goals by early summer. But she urged residents to have patience and continue practicing Covid-19 safety measures, cautioning that medium and large gatherings still are not safe for anyone and that relaxing safety measures too early could result in another surge of the disease. Powers said she's heard fatigue from residents and questions about when life can get back to normal. "We're still in the middle of a pandemic," Powers said. "Right now there's no such thing as a risk-free activity." It's important that people continue wearing masks, practicing social distancing and following other safety measures as the county works toward its vaccination goals, Powers said. "My biggest concern at this point is that we're all getting *impatient and that people are going to stop doing* what we learned at the beginning ... and before we can get the majority of the population vaccinated, we're going to have many more cases," she said.

In looking at Summer activities for Ephraim Moravian Church, we will host outdoor events (masks required), including a service at the Cemetery on May 30, Vespers, Bible Studies and children's events. We will continue to stream our Sunday Services live on Facebook **<u>If you wish to</u> join us in the Sanctuary as a lay reader or guest <u>musician</u>, please let Pastor Dawn know as soon as possible. We'll be scheduling for the summer lay readers/musicians by Mid- May.

Reports from the Elders & Trustees

<u>Elders Report</u>: The Board of Elders considered a request from Ephraim Historic Foundation to resume tours over the summer months. The elders voted to post-pone any requests for tours until September. The Board is working on another Outdoor Worship Service in connection with Memorial Day (see separate article).

<u>Trustee Report</u>: The Trustees, after much research and consultation with our music director and volunteer musicians, gratefully accepted the donation of a digital piano for the Sanctuary (on order). This was fully funded by a generous donation from the estate of George Veyerhaden. The Chickering piano has been offered to non-profits in our area (with 2 currently interested). We are hopeful it will have many more years of service in the community.

UPDATE FROM THE UGANDAN MORAVIAN CHURCH-OUR

SEMI-ANNUAL PIGGERY PROJECT!


"As part of the proceeds from the piggery project funded by Ephraim Moravian Church through the Board of World Mission and contributions from members of the Moravian Church in Uganda, the church bought its first ever piece of land on July 8th , 2020. This land (Kibanja) measuring 100ft by 50ft is located at Kabubiro Village, Najja Sub – County in Buikwe district.

"In extension of Church land, the Moravian Church in Uganda further bought another piece of land of similar size next to the already acquired land in the same village on December 5th, 2020. With this land, the Moravian Church in Uganda anticipates to construct its national offices, a church structure and implement other development projects.

"In response to the Government requirement for an area of convenience for members during meetings, the Moravian Church in Uganda applied for a grant from Unity Mission and Development Board to construct a four (04) stance Pit Latrine for convenience and also contribute to the prevention of outbreaks and spread of diseases such as cholera due to improved disposal of waste."

This was shared on Facebook, and while some of it does not apply to us in Door County because we can't donate fresh meat or refrigerated items, there are some great hints in there for what could be donated and appreciated by our food banks! Remember that the church is open daily if you'd like to bring in non-perishables for Feed My People.

Sharing wisdom from a food bank volunteer:

1. Everyone donates Kraft Mac & Cheese in the box. But it needs milk & butter which is hard to get from food banks.

- 2. Boxed Milk is a treasure. Kids need it for cereal, which they get a lot of.
- 3. Everyone donates pasta sauce & spaghetti noodles.
- 4. Canned Foods should be Pop Tops OR donate Can Openers.
- 5. Oil is a luxury needed for Rice a Roni which they get a lot of.
- 6. Spices, Salt & Pepper are a real gift.
- 7. Tea bags & Coffee are caring gifts.
- 8. Sugar & Flour are treats.
- 9. Important are fresh produce donated by farmers & grocery stores.

10. Seeds are great in spring & summer because growing can be easy for some.

- 11. Rarely is there fresh meat.
- 12. Tuna & Crackers make a good lunch.
- 13. Hamburger Helper goes nowhere without ground beef.
- 14. They get lots of peanut butter and jelly but NEED sandwich bread.
- 15. Butter or Margarine are good.
- 16. Eggs are a commodity!
- 17. Cake mix & Frosting makes it possible to make a child's birthday cake.
- 18. Dishwashing Detergent is very expensive & is always appreciated.
- 19. Feminine hygiene products are a luxury & women will cry over them.
- 20. Everyone loves Stove Top Stuffing.

Bonus: CASH makes it possible for the Food Bank to buy what's missing and buy in bulk.

There has been an increase in the number of people using the church drive and parking lot as a shortcut while not conducting business in the church. The traffic includes large landscaping vehicles and other commercial vehicles and has caused safety concerns and much wear and tear on the pavement.
