Reflection - by Rev. Cory Kemp

Salvation, the deliverance from sin and its consequences, creates a picture of trust and faith in God. In this place we are willing to be vulnerable and ask God, "What then should we do?"

John told the crowds gathered to be baptized by him that they were to "bear fruits worthy of repentance." In a nutshell, they were to listen to him, be grateful for the salvation of God, but not squander it. There is more to this story; the people in the crowd wanted to know more of what John had to say. "And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

Whether we choose to act on God's response to this question of what we should do with our salvation, is up to us. We may be intimidated by the answer, even by how obvious it is. What if you like both your coats and want to keep them for yourself? What if it is uncomfortable to share your food?

Our Christian faith is both pragmatic and inconvenient, more often than not. John pointed out some straightforward ways to bear fruits worthy of repentance, indicative of the salvation you and I have already received. Salvation's fruits, born through us by trust and faith in God, are beautifully varied and always welcomed in the kingdom of God.
