If All Else Fails

It was English class, the first week of freshman year at Luther College. The assignment? A 500-word theme. No problem! I could write. I was the editor of my high school paper, after all. So with great pride, I handed in my first paper. Expecting nothing but the best, one week later my masterpiece was returned with... a great big red letter "F". Now I'd have to pack up, go home and confess to friend and family alike that I'd flunked out, that I was a failure. Like the Psalmist, I surely said "Oh Lord, give me relief from my distress!" But as I'd been thrown overboard, I was also thrown a lifeline. By correcting errors, I could raise my grade to an acceptable level.

After the Crucifixion, surely the Disciples must have felt complete failure. After following Jesus during their years together, they had to have wondered if this was the end of it all, not to mention their personal failures. To them, the future must have seemed very bleak indeed. Having the sense of, likewise, being thrown overboard, they too were provided a lifeline. Not only did Jesus appear to them, He was with them. They could see Him, touch Him, eat with Him.

In like manner, we have been thrown an eternal lifeline. This is nothing ethereal. Jesus comes to us in bread and wine, flesh and blood. He is as real to us as when the Disciples encountered the living Lord. This is a lifeline that will never fail.
