WHAT NEXT? Acts I: 1-11. by Kathleen Harris

He was here, until He wasn't. Then He came back but left again, rising upwards, hidden by a cloud. If I were one of the apostles, squinting at the sky, I would have shaken my head and mumbled, "What next?"

Action, that's what's next, was the answer given by two strangers in white. They had suddenly appeared. "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven?" Class with the physical Jesus was over. It was time to venture forth to share His message of love and redemption. The Holy Spirit, a different kind of encounter with God, was coming with gifts of confidence and guidance.

The last few years have been a "what next?" kind of world, a surprising ocean of confusion. First, a decade of tumultuous change: technological, social, world order... not to mention new understandings in what constitutes good manners and correct punctuation! Then a bizarre kind of pause during the first year of the pandemic, a time of letting go of people and assumptions, a time of startling revelations. More recently, a quick succession of dramatic events, heightened by the 24-hour news cycle. All while living in a beautiful, outwardly serene Door County bubble. In a way, it mirrors the last weeks of Jesus' earthly life. I can empathize with the apostles who experienced the ascension, frozen in place, staring at the sky, mouths agape.

But for them and us, the sky is not where to look. Instead, take a page from the playbook of Acts. Let's steady ourselves with purposeful deeds of sacred meditation. Prayer, sacraments, and fellowship are ways to witness. So is caring for creation and serving the broken and broken-hearted. Yes, it can all be quite annoying, these rollicking waves of uncertainty. Some days simply mustering a kind and measured response to a neighbor's idiosyncrasies is a challenge. But like the apostles, we have been called to discern and share Holy Truth. The outcome of the ascension story is all about movement. In the words of Todd Beamer*, "Let's roll."
