## **Reflection by Pastor Dan Olson**

"Dear Jesus, thank you for your presence today as we gather. We pray you'll also join the Ladies Aid on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock when everyone will bring a dish to pass. Also, we pray for a speedy recovery for Aunt Hattie after her facelift surgery..."

Why do we pray and for what purpose? Is it to make announcements or to instruct God on the expected results? I've had reservations about using the phrase, "The power of prayer." The power for what? As a battering ram? No, prayer is a conduit that transmits our prayer to the heart of God.

Please understand, I am by no means mocking prayer. To the contrary. Prayer is a precious gift to be used with appreciation, properly – and often.

Have you ever avoided someone who accosts you in a one-way conversation with a litany of complaints? Prayer often becomes like that. Oscar Wilde once said, "When the gods wish to punish us, they simply answer our prayers." We must "Be still and know that I am God." Also, despite our prayers, at times it seems God doesn't answer them at all, meaning that God has said "no." We may even wonder if we are praying correctly.

Jesus bestowed on us the perfect prayer, The Lord's Prayer, as it is known, or "the Our Father." It is truly the most intimate conversation we can have with our Lord. All our needs are included therein. Even though the prayer may become rote, its efficacy does not. Paul says, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus." I invite you to do just that.
