## The Lord Has Come – Rev. Cory Kemp

The word magnify means to make something appear larger than it is. The object being viewed doesn't change shape or character, but it does change the viewer.

My dad always carried a small magnifying glass in his pocket. He had several, and they were all about the size of the palm of his hand, hinged between soft, protective leather covers. He could retrieve it quickly when he needed to examine something more closely or read finer print than his eyesight allowed. Such a simple thing, really, but it expanded his world, making accessible what otherwise would have remained unavailable.

The word magnify can also mean to extol or glorify, as Mary does in praising God for the great blessing of bearing the Christ child, he whom Isaiah had called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

For this special Christmas celebration today, I believe a bit of both meanings for magnify are accurate and important.

When Mary proclaimed, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior," she was praising and glorifying God who had done great things, not just for her, but for all people, particularly the poor, the oppressed and the downtrodden. And, in lifting up her praises, she was making God appear larger than God had appeared before. God's shape and character had not changed, but Mary's vision, hope and faith, her love for God, became more accessible and more available to her.

Mary's words are the familiar entryway to the season of Advent, the beginning of the church year, a time of peace and joy that fills us with God's presence among us. As we celebrate an extra bit of Christmas this summer morning, may our souls magnify God along with Mary today, and may our spirits rejoice with hers in God our Savior.
