Reflection: "Lost in the House"

Have you ever lost anything inside your house? I can't count the number of things I have lost right inside my house. Thankfully, some items are just missing for a few minutes, as I retrace my steps (or have my husband call my cell phone so that I can locate it!). But other times, things can be lost for a great while. I remember many years ago, losing a set of keys... only to find them when we were moving... they had slipped between the bed and stand! It is frustrating to know that an item is somewhere within the walls of our homes, hidden from our view.

In Jesus' stories about people lost and found, the symbols he uses are sheep and coin. The sheep walks away, necessitating a search party. The coin is lost within the house. This speaks of people who have not left the family, the community or the church; but are lost. They are the ones 'hidden in plain sight'. They've become discouraged, disheartened, disillusioned, going through the motions. They need to be found, brought back to experience the love, grace and mercy of God, and by extension, God's people.

In the story of the Lost Coin, the woman did 4 things when she discovered that something was missing: She lit a lamp, she swept the house, she searched carefully and she threw a party when the coin was found. Can we do the same when someone is hidden in plain sight?

- Light the Lamp- See beyond off-putting behaviors to the hurt they are masking
- Sweep the House- What are some of the things WE need to stop doing in order to bring healing? What are some of the old ways of being which create barriers?
- Search Carefully- Be sensitive to the people around us. Make sure we take no one for granted.
- Throw a party! Perhaps not in the literal sense, but it's always a good idea to celebrate the people in our lives.

May we be a people who restore those who are lost, bringing hope, healing, and abundant love. – Pastor Dawn Volpe

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
