Reflection: "Penniless"

"He died penniless." When we hear these words, they usually describe great artists and musicians who died before their contributions were fully understood or appreciated. They are sad commentaries on the times they lived in and the tragic nature of their lives.

I always marveled at the artistry of Joseph Mohr, a parish priest who penned the beloved poem 'Silent Night,' When I researched his life, I read the same poignant words: "he died penniless."

But instead of tragedy, these words lauded the life of a man with a profound generosity of spirit. He did not die penniless because he was unappreciated or unrecognized. He died without means because he chose to give away his income to the people who needed it most. In a war-torn country, he provided shelter for the homeless and education for the poor. He was called, 'A reliable friend of mankind; toward the poor, a gentle, helping father.' His memorial from the townspeople is the Joseph Mohr School located a few yards from his grave.*

His life reminds me of Jesus, who had no material wealth to give. Rather, he gave himself away. He gave himself away so that we might have peace in this life and hope for the life to come.

May we find grace to give ourselves away - in bringing peace to people torn apart by strife, in bringing economic support to people torn apart by poverty, in bringing forgiveness to people torn apart by anger, in bringing hope to those torn apart by despair. May we give ourselves away with abandon - to love and serve, following the One who gave everything away.
