In Thanksgiving for 170 Years (Historical Excerpts from: A Celebration in Words and Pictures by Fran Burton)

On a cold February day in 1853, Andrew Iverson and three companions set out on foot. The trip across snow-covered ice from Green Bay to Eagle Island took three days. Early the morning after their arrival, Ole Larsen led the group across the frozen bay to the shore, a distance of about a mile and a half. Following a day of exploration and soul searching, Iverson knelt among the evergreens and asked God's Guidance:

"I quietly stepped aside in among the small evergreens and kneeled down upon the white snow. The Savior knows how fervently I prayed on that spot for the first time. I received full assurance that right here would our Atoner plant his little congregation and never forsake it in spite of our meager circumstances. I returned to my companions and told them that I was solemnly assured that here was the spot for our congregation..." – Andrew Iverson, February 1853

Assured that God would not desert him or the church, he decided that the shore of Eagle Harbor was the place for his community and church. With \$500 loaned by a benefactor, Iverson purchased 425 acres of land along the shoreline and up the bluff. When he returned home with the news, his congregation rejoiced and voted to name their new home, Ephraim- a Biblical word meaning 'doubly fruitful.'

Although it was borrowed money that purchased the land, it was faith that built a community and church. Iverson and his little congregation moved to the area in May 1853.

170 years later, we look back in gratitude, keenly aware that we are standing on the shoulders of our beloved ancestors. The Lord has indeed, not forsaken our congregation. We continue to serve our Savior in the 21st Century by being the Church of the Open Doorwelcoming the weary traveler, sustaining those in crisis, providing a joyful embrace for all who enter this sacred space. May we continue to be 'doubly fruitful' for generations to come! – Pastor Dawn
