Opioid and meth use has become an increasing concern in Door County over the past several years, as the county has caught up to addiction trends in other parts of the state and country. Local officials in law enforcement and health and human services, as well as those involved in recovery programs, say they're alarmed by trends in opioid use and polysubstance use locally.

Door County Knock and the League of Women Voters of Door County are co-hosting a community forum on these issues, covering what's happening in the county, what resources are available and where the community can go from here.

The event will feature a panel discussion including local officials and service providers who work on these issues daily and people who have experienced addiction.

Thank you for your generosity! Our 'Ramp Up' project met its goal! We sent over \$3,000 to Habitat for Humanity!





The Pastor and Angela Sherman attended the Provincial Synod held in Bethlehem, PA. In each issue of our newsletter, we will highlight an initiative endorsed by Synod. This month we present 'A Call to Faithful Action', addressing the scourge of gun violence in the United States. 2 people endorsed this call to action on the floor of Synod. One was a victim of a school shooting, who saw her principal die. The other was an avid gun owner and hunter. Both advocated for the need to speak out as people of Faith. Following the vote, our outgoing and incoming Presidents of the Provincial Elders Conference issued a joint letter:

The Moravian Church Northern Province, a denomination with members in twelve states and the District of Columbia, meeting in legislative session (our Provincial Synod) in Bethlehem, PA, overwhelmingly adopted a resolution entitled, 'A Call for Faithful Action of the Moravian Church Northern Province toward an End to Gun Violence." In it we lamented the lack of legislative action to prevent further loss of life from gun violence.

We called on all of the delegates in attendance at our synod to both affirm the right for US citizens to keep and bear arms and also be advocates for responsible fire-arm legislation at the nation, state, and local levels of government. These include, but are not limited to:

- Mandating universal background checks for all gun sales
- Extending waiting periods for all fire-arm sales and requiring fire-arm safety training
- Establishing the minimum age of 21 to purchase a fire-arm
- Prohibiting the sales of military style assault weapons and banning high-capacity magazines and all weapons and modifications that enable multiple rounds to be fired each time the trigger is pulled.

We commit ourselves to raise awareness, educate and promote advocacy of measures that aim to eliminate gun violence and mass shootings. We, as members of the Moravian Church, call upon you, our elected leaders, to enact responsible fire-arm legislation that fulfills the above points. We also pledge to hold you accountable to fulfilling these expectations such that the United States becomes a safer country. We pledge to hold you in prayer as you consider such critical and important issues of our time.

Cemetery News & Reminder about Decorations

In October, it will be a year since I became the cemetery superintendent. Every week there is something new to learn. It helps to have members like you who are patient and supportive, and church leadership that is so responsive.

Surveyor Brian Frisque and his crew shared their findings in July, with more information to come. Memorial gifts in honor of Dick Bierman are helping fund survey work. Stay tuned for an update later in the fall. Meanwhile, with technical writing guidance from Rob Meyer and others, I am preparing a **"Guidelines for Grave Monuments"** for Trustee review in the coming month(s). The guidelines are based on the existing Rules and Regulations (they do not replace but rather clarify the Rules and Regulations) and in future will be shared with people selecting monuments.

With summer in full swing, it is also time to review what the Rules and Regulations say about **grave decorations** (see H. 1-4). If you have questions, concerns, or suggestions please contact me and I can include them in my next report to the Board of Trustees.

- From May 1 to November 1 only live plantings will be allowed.
- From November 2 to April 30 evergreen or natural material wreaths may be placed on gravesites.
- Planted flowers will not extend more than eight inches from the headstone [otherwise affects mowing].
- Bushes, trees, shrubbery or creeping [invasive] plants may not be planted at any gravesite.
- Neither shall any flower boxes, potted plants, jars, urns or receptacles or decorations be permitted [affects mowing].
- Metal spikes [shepherd's hooks] that hold potted plants above the ground are permissible within eight inches of the headstone but will be discarded if not cared for.
- Commemorative markers or American flags shall be placed for only two weeks surrounding national holidays.
