Bulletin Reflection Pastor Dan G. Olson

Today's text from Matthew 15 presents a whole cast of three characters with plenty of nouns, pronouns, verbs and adverbs to describe them perfectly.

A Canaanite woman approached Jesus one day and proceeded to make a pest of herself. Why shouldn't she? Her daughter was severely 'possessed by a demon' which is an ancient way of saying that she was beyond medical help. She was gracious enough when she said "have mercy on me, O Lord, Son of David".

But here's the strange part of it all, Jesus answered her not a single word. That seems to be so out of character with what we usually think of "Sweet Jesus". And it didn't help one bit when the disciples were irritated with the woman. "Send her away, for she's crying after us". Despite the woman's desperation, she never lost her sense of respect for Jesus. "Pest" perhaps isn't the right word to describe this desperate mother. Shall we say, rather, that she was persistent? or tenacious? or determined?

I have little doubt Jesus became annoyed with people. We might be perplexed at such a notion, but we must let the humanity of Jesus bubble to the surface of his existence. We dare not try to tame Jesus with "holy smokescreen".
