God's Abundance is for Everyone, by the Rev. Cory L. Kemp

God doesn't operate by the same rules we do, which can be quite irritating. But Jonah was downright angry with God for sparing Nineveh when they turned from their evil ways, asked God's forgiveness and repented. Why?

Apparently, God was curious too, asking Jonah, "Is it right for you to be angry?" Jonah's response was to walk outside the city, make a space for himself to sit, and was a bit cranky that God brought a bush to shield him from the sun, but took it away the next day.

God's pointed reply, was that if Jonah could express care for a bush with which he had no part in creating, why should God not care for the great city of Nineveh, its numerous people, and even its animals?

It seems Jonah was having a very bad day, during which nothing was right, nobody deserved God's lovingkindness, forgiveness or favor. Or, perhaps it simply boggled poor Jonah's mind that God really was as generous, merciful and abundant in steadfast love as he had always been taught.

In that context, it is so very easy to feel cheated or shortchanged by God's generosity when our attention is drawn to what other people have that we yearn for but have not yet received. It's human, and it is that simple. Equally simple is that God isn't human. We tend to ascribe human limitations and shortcomings to God when we feel most vulnerable, which is when we need God the most.

The Grace that God gave to Ninevah was reserved for them. They only had to ask and receive. It is no different for each of us. When we are ready to receive, we often realize God already offered, and all we need to do is say yes.

There is more than enough of God's rich abundance for all of us. And God delights in sharing it with us.
