Your Tax Dollars At Work - Pastor Dawn Volpe

I am so grateful when I see tax dollars put to good use. When our school asks for more money to repair buildings or purchase land, taxpayers, with few exceptions, vote to shoulder the burden. We do so willingly because we know that the children of our community will benefit. When I drive across well-paved and lit roadways, my tax dollars are at work, benefitting me directly. When I walk on the sidewalks along Highway 42 in Ephraim, I remember what it was like hugging the side of the road, dodging cars. I am very grateful that tax dollars enable me to safely traverse our village.

Even with the obvious benefits derived from our tax dollars, I hate paying taxes! It's a burden, even when I know that I and others benefit from the funds generated. I am one of the many who complain every April 15th.

If this is how it is among people who benefit from taxes, can you imagine what it's like for people who pay taxes and derive absolutely no benefit. We remember the slogan before the Revolutionary War: 'taxation without representation'.

Jesus' fellow citizens had to pay taxes to their occupiers. Their taxes enabled Rome to oppress them. It's no wonder the people complained. I'm sure there were plenty of heated conversations over Rome's unjust tax system. Anyone who collected taxes for Rome was considered a traitor. A conversation about taxes was the perfect cover for the Religious Leaders as they sought to entrap Jesus with his own words. The conversation seemed innocuous- there was only one right answer-Rome's system of taxation was unjust. But if Jesus expressed that, he could be turned in to the authorities as an agitator.

Jesus understood the motivation behind the query. Sometimes people will engage us in conversation, not to gain perspective, but to manipulate. When that happens, may we have the wisdom of Jesus, who saw through the ruse, remained above the fray, and steered the conversation away from the trivial... to the eternal.
