## Reflection - by Pastor Dan G. Olson

This would be a chaotic world if we dispensed with all calendars, clocks, watches or schedules. Instead, we have become controlled by time and have become obsessed with it. Have you noticed that the later you are for an appointment, the faster time goes? Or, when we are waiting for something, or someone, the longer time seems to pass?

Why am I talking about time? It's because our Lord, in His transfiguration, pierced the realm of time and splintered it to pieces. In that mountain-top experience, Peter, James and John, along with Jesus, were joined by Moses and Elijah, figures from the long distant past. And as Jesus stood there, dazzling in mysterious and astounding brilliance, that light shone over whatever had been, and over all that ever would be. Then God spoke, saying "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." Just imagine how astonishing this experience was!

One does not encounter the Almighty and return to life unchanged by the experience. And that includes Jesus himself. It also includes you and me, because the light of the Transfiguration has shown in our eyes and enveloped our very being.

But now comes the hard part. Living on a spiritual high all the time would be exhausting enough, but having had that experience ultimately leads to the tough work of descending into the valleys of life. Just as it was for Jesus. For after the transfiguration he trod the path of toil and service, leading ultimately to the cross. That is our calling as well. We pick up our cross in the delight of service in Jesus' Name as we, in our own way, become beacons of light. So, let's get going as we trod through the fast-approaching Lenten season. Let's get going! Time is of the essence.
